**Passover**  
*(A type of our redemption)*

The Need - They were in bondage.  
The Origin - God  
The Means - The lamb (1 Peter 1:18-20; John 1:29)  
The Effects

- a. salvation from death (John 5:24)
- b. deliverance from bondage (Romans 6:8, 9)
- c. freedom to go on to Canaan (a type of the blessed life or spiritual maturity, not Heaven)

The Requirement - The application of the blood.  
Knowledge of what should be done wasn't enough.
